SUMMARY OF THIS MONTH'S ACTIVITIES AND OUTPUTS

- **Visual search & clearance of 315,581 m² of land** through hand, electronic, and visual techniques.
- **Removal and destruction of 287 hazardous Remnants of Conflict¹** – 273 sub-munitions and 14 items of unexploded ordnance

BATTLE AREA CLEARANCE AND EXPLOSIVE ORDNANCE DISPOSAL

The continued focus of clearance for this month is towards clearance of agricultural and pastoral areas for the recovery of livelihoods.

MAG worked in the following areas and achieved the following outputs from 1st February to 29th February 2008:

- **Area 6:** 20 BAC teams, one reconnaissance team, and one mechanical team continue to operate. They worked in 9 towns: Jibchit, Yohmor, Kfar Tebnite, Kfar Sir, Zawtar West, Kfar Roumane, Qosaybe, Aadchit, and Nabatieh City. These teams used visual, electronic and mechanical methods of clearance, clearing an area of 308,725 square metres. 287 Remnants of Conflict were found and destroyed.
- **Area 7:** 2 BAC teams operating in the village of Maalieh. One of these teams moved to Area 6 during the month. These teams have used visual and electronic methods of clearance, clearing an area of 6,856 square metres.

All teams are contributing to the **social and economic recovery and development** of South Lebanon through the safe, efficient, and effective clearance of Remnants of Conflict.

COMMUNITY LIAISON (CL)

All Contact Officers have continued to undertake community liaison activities at the pre-clearance, clearance, and post-clearance stages.

There were 275 activities during the month, including 28 data collection activities², 37 liaison activities, 17 UXO tasking reports, 2 media visits, and 169 other activities (e.g., mapping, hosting media visits, QA/QC) that support clearance work by providing control point locations and storage areas, securing land owner's approval for using their house/fields for clearance activities, liaison with local authorities, and emphasizing public safety messages to communities undergoing clearance.

EMERGENCY UXO CLEARANCE IN NAHR EL-BARED REFUGEE CAMP, TRIPOLI

MAG still has international technical staff and 4 Mine Action Teams available to undertake UXO clearance and/or provide technical support to UNRWA and other humanitarian agencies.

¹ MAG uses the term *Remnants of Conflict* (RoC) to describe all items recovered and destroyed as part of its humanitarian disarmament activities, which include Anti-Personal and Anti-Vehicle mines, Explosive Remnants of War (ERW), abandoned and unexploded ordnance (UXO) and SA/LW. This term has been developed to reflect more accurately the broad range of clearance activities undertaken by MAG.

² Data collection includes population, socio-economic data, village services and beneficiary details. If the teams discover a minefield/dangerous area then information is collected specific to the dangerous area/minefield in addition to the general information form.

Improved Safety of Communities

By removing the threats of Remnants of Conflict, and increasing vulnerable groups' awareness of these threats, a tangible **improvement of the safety of communities** affected by conflict is being achieved.

Rebuilding Communities

By removing the threat of Remnants of Conflict, communities can return to areas previously vacated or re-establish themselves elsewhere. As such, the quality of life of a population can be increased and a **more stable and productive environment created**.

Supporting the Recovery of Sustainable Livelihoods

The presence of Remnants of Conflict restricts community recovery and development. Once a community has been able to re-establish itself in a physical location, it also must develop a livelihood upon which it can sustain itself. The presence of Remnants of Conflict limits the land available for economic use such as farming and agriculture, business, and tourism, and acts as a barrier to natural resources. **By removing Remnants of Conflict MAG allows vital land to be utilized and for communities to improve their livelihoods.**

Key Contribution to National Recovery Efforts

By creating a safe environment, MAG is supporting the reconstruction of Lebanon's primary infrastructure, including schools and medical facilities, which is **vital for the mid-to-long-term recovery and development of the country.**
